




A. NEW VISION RAINBOW HOME -

Shelter home for street girl children

New Vision Rainbow Home is a collaboration between Rainbow Foundation India and New Vision , established in January 2016, completing 5 years of successful journey. The Rainbow Home program secures the basic rights of the girl child through guaranteed education, nutrition, clothing , healthcare, recreation, love, security and support to ensure their reintegration into the mainstream Indian Society. The girls are enrolled in regular school programs and age appropriate classes, usually after a short period of remedial teaching as well as by a wide volunteer base and buddy programs with children/ students in more privileged schools. New Vision Rainbow Home runs in a functional Government school, Barne Vidyalaya at Mangalwar Peth , Pune since November 2016 which is provided by Pune Municipal Corporation.


Profile of the children: The following chart demonstrates the background of the children that are staying in New Vision Rainbow Home.






AGE WISE DISTRIBUTION OF CHILDREN

Health intervention during coronavirus pandemic

Considering the pandemic situation and lockdown situation, the following Preventive measures taken:


- Visitors, Donors and Volunteers and Non -residential staff were completely prevented from entering Rainbow home.
- Awareness poster prepared by National Office were displayed

- Children were guided on self-care practices like hand wash after every two hours, drinking warm water, maintaining physical distance with outsiders, wearing masks.
- Apart from regular diet eating or drinking juices of satiric fruits like lemon, oranges, apple, or pineapple.
- Quarantine facilities created for children who were coming from outside to Rainbow homes
 or who went to visit parents or relatives are returned. Everyday temperature & weight was
 monitored for these children. To create this facility, we requested extra spaces from Pune
 Municipal Corporation and Education board.
- Doctors were available on telephonic consultation for even cough and cold or fever for close monitoring on children daily basis corona track report is being filled in softcopy.
- Children were encouraged to for steam inhalation by using child friendly steamers and 'Pranayama.'
- Awareness sessions are being conducted by the staff on how to protect girls from corona diseases every day and it has been made mandatory for girls to wash their hands every two hours. Elder girls were involved to ensure Hand washing activity and they guided all the small girls.

Education

When a child comes to Rainbow Home, taking into consideration the child's educational background a baseline assessment in done and accordingly the child is provided support by engaging in Bridge Course or Remedial. It is ensured that the child is placed in age-appropriate class, for which is provided support through bridge course which is for a duration of six months.





- Due to Covid 19 the schools are closed, online education is going on for all children from 1st to 12th Std. For students of 1st to 5th std. teachers send PDF through WhatsApp referring to which the Home team takes studies of the children and sends back assessment sheets to the teacher.
- For 6th to 8th std. children's online classes are conducted by school in short intervals. The Home team helps the children in their studies.



- Regular online classes are conducted by school for 9th to 12th Std. students. Special subject wise online tuition classes are also conducted by volunteers and special teachers.
- Agastya Foundation, a volunteer group took online classes on Math and Science. They
 conducted online science experiments to make the lesson and learning more interactive and
 interesting.
- Bhoomi foundation another volunteer group took Robot making classes. Apart from that children were also a part of discussion forums where in they put their questions which was answered.





Life Skill Session

3 different groups were made, the home manager, teacher, and Education coordinator conducted 16 **life skill sessions** with the children as per needs identified. Below topics are conducted with the children:

Extra Curricular Activities

Art and craft activities enables children to develop their creativity, language skills, decision making and critical thinking. The children were engaged on a regular basis in various forms of art and craft activities wherein they are taught the techniques of drawing, wall painting, pencil skletch, paper quelling, Rangoli making and Mehendi Art,



greeting cards, ceramic painting, thumb printing, pasting of seeds making flowers and other items with paper.

One of the volunteering group "Passion Guru" took online classes of drawing, Dance, Singing. Expertise of different fields took sessions. Children enjoyed their sessions.





Sports & Games

Sports is a very integral part of child's development, it helps in building healthy bones and muscles, increases fitness, improves sleep, helps children to socialize, improves their cooperation skills, boosts their self-confidence. Rainbow Homes gives children the opportunity to exercise their right to play. Home managers engage children in outdoor sports activities daily for 2 hours in morning and evening. Children enjoys playing Kho Kho, Musical Chairs, Running & Catch and hide and seek.



15 children attended karate class & football practice sessions regularly. Though football sessions are closed for now due to pandemic

Yoga classes are conducted twice in a week for 25 children 4 children are practicing karate for green and brown belts.

Various kinds of activities are conducted from time to time which gives children a platform to express themselves as well as widens their understanding about society, its culture, dimensions that they live in. it gives them an opportunity to explore new areas which further contribute towards their growth and development.



Kho kho, Kabbadi, relay, Tug of war, hanging biscuit, sack race etc. games conducted on various reasons. All girls participated in different games, according to their age. Winning children were given a gift as a token for encouragement and appreciation.

Celebration & Festivals

To let the children, stay rooted with Indian culture, New Vision Rainbow Home celebrates various festivals in home level such as Eid, Ganesh Chaturthi, Diwali, Holi, Christmas, Bondla, Gurupurnima, Gudi Padwa

On 21st June on International day of Yoga children did yoga and meditation which they continue doing it regularly



151st birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi was celebrated on 2nd October. This was the theme of "Under the stars" activity. The girls watched a film on Mahatma Gandhi. The children were informed about his life and his contribution towards various social reforms. One act play on "Swacchata Ki Aur Jago" was performed.

14th Nov is Children's day and, on this occasion, we organized various activities like drawing, speech & games.

The Republic day & Independence Day was also celebrated.

The following days & anniversary of Savitribai Phule birth anniversary on 3rd January, Swami Vivekananda and Jijamata on 12th January

The 5th anniversary of New Vision Rainbow Home was celebrated on 27th January. The children cut the cake. On that day children performed dance and singing.

We celebrated the birth anniversary of Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj on 19th Feb.

Birthdays of children were celebrated in which the girls found out different ways to enjoy during the difficult times of lockdown. As there was restriction and many things were not possible to do, children learnt to find happiness in celebrating in a different way. Children made cake in a cooker using biscuits.



The FPA organization celebrated "Women's Day" and they are giving information about adult- hood changes, hygiene.

Amid lockdown & staying at home, our children from New Vision Rainbow Home did not forget to observe the earth day & pay gratitude to mother earth for giving us life.

On 21st June on International day of Yoga children did yoga and meditation which they continue doing it regularly

Children Participation and leadership

At Rainbow Homes every child has the right to participate in decision making, has the right to speak and share interests and concerns. They demonstrate their participation and leadership through various groups and committees. There are different committees set up in the home which are led and monitored by the children which brings ownership and transparency in the work. Committees such as cleaning, food, health etc are formed and regular meeting, discussions take place for the better functioning of the committees which further ensures the growth and development of the home and its children. Children have learned the concepts of committee which brought ownership, unity among themselves, they came forward and lead their respective committees by conducting various activities over a period.

Children are taking active part in Balsabha's which are independently run by children. Children are taking leadership and raising their voice in Balsabhaand discuss various topics of concerns and come up with solutions.

One girl, participated in Youth advisory group online meeting in which there was discussion on injustice faced by youth, impact on jobs & strategies of youth to deal with such challenges.

Engagement with families

Parents have been incredibly supportive and regularly come to visit the children. Parent's meetings are conducted quarterly and the children's progress, health status etc are discussed in the meetings. This year conducting parent's meeting in the home was not possible considering the pandemic condition, so we contacted many of our parents over phone and discussed child's progress and awareness over phone. When parents visited home during festival, we greeted them with cards or diyas painted by children. After November, 20 we conducted corner meetings or home visits with the family.

SUPPORT PROVIDED TO PARENTS DURING THE LOCK DOWN AND POST LOCKDOWN

During lockdown or even after the lockdown there was no work to our parents who are daily wage worker and due to covid the people living on the street were restricted at many places. The whole situation became a challenge for our parents to earn to fulfil the daily needs. Some parents were living in such situations with the children and the fear of corona infection to them as well. Rainbow Foundation decided to continue distributing ration kits to such more needy families. We provided ration kits or cost of ration kits to the parents. Within city our team reached to the parents and those who migrated to other cities we contacted them and ensure the support reach to them through shop keepers who will provide them ration on behalf of us.




B. OPENING EDUCATIONAL PATHWAYS FOR MIGRANT CHILDREN (OEPMC)

Through **Opening Education Pathways for Migrant Children (OEPMC)** project, urban migrant children in the city of Pune have access to teaching and learning experiences. The OEPMC project runs under the head of Education, Health and Social Developmental activities. As New Vision works with the migrant population it may not be possible to mainstream all the children into formal school; however sincere efforts are being taken to train every child at least till the time they are at the site. Some children, who are expected to remain at the site for more than 6 months, are assisted in formal school enrolment. Children of school going age are admitted in their age appropriate class

room under the Right to education act (RTE). This year the pandemic affected the migrant population the most. The fear of Covid and sudden lockdown created so much panic. Many of them fled to their native place and are jobless. Many laborers came back to city as there were no source of livelihood in their village


In the year 20-21 we worked in total 10 Day care centres/Crèches at **Pisoli, Kharadi, Bavdhan, Dhanori , Lohagaon, Wagholi.** This year the functioning of the centres was quite uncertain due to Covid 19 pandemic. We were a bit reluctant to start due to Government safety guidelines and official permission. Though some of the builders wanted us to run the centres but we avoided as the situation was not safe.


Total No of Children (2020-21)

Health:

Nutrition: Mid-day meal was served to children from 15th June 2020 which was stopped due to Lockdown. Fresh meals were cooked in the respective centres where the builder provided an extra room for kitchen. A menu was planned taking care of the nutrition need of the children. Hot and fresh food was served to the children 6 days a week.

Growth Monitoring: Height and weight was taken of all children to monitor their growth.


Sanitization: The centres are sanitized properly every day. The teachers and helper are taking extra precaution to maintain cleanliness and hygiene following all the Covid safety measures. There are hand sanitizers in all centres and disinfectant spray is used to sanitize the centre.

Bal Sabha is the monthly children open meeting fórum where a topic is given to the children and they discuss and share their view on a particular issue.



C. PROTECTING RIGHTS OF STREET AND VULNERABLE CHILDREN (PRSVC)


Focusing through our intervention to assist and guide the street children, helping them for an overall holistic development, project PRSVC – "Protecting Rights of Street & Vulnerable children" was implemented in 6 communities in January 2018. Though working in one community was discontinued within a month as other social organisation was working for their development and the other community in Tulapur, Lonikand shifted their location as the land owner started construction in that area. By June 2018 we identified another community at Wadgaon Sheri and started working there. "Children Resource Centre" was established in all communities which were managed by the community teacher or volunteer, Outreach Worker and supervised by a Coordinator. In these 3 years various activities were conducted and planned as per the set indicators focusing on education, health awareness, reproductive health, Early Childhood Care, Empowerment, life skill sessions, Right to play activities etc. The CRC was also established as a Safe Space for Adolescents, Youth and women where the community people were encouraged and given a place to confidently share their issues, problems and conflicts.


Total No. of beneficiaries



Education

The following Educational activities were conducted in all centres:

- Bridge courses were conducted till March 2020 for children to mainstream them to age appropriate class and support classes were taken for school going children.
- E- Learning software was updated as there was a change in 2nd std syllabus
- Due to Covid 19 pandemic, lockdown was imposed in the entire country. Schools were closed from 20th March 2020. All examination were cancelled and children till 8th std. were promoted as per their unit test results. Online classes were introduced by the education dept. As most of our parents do not have android phone and internet access the children were unable to access the online academic sessions conducted by schools.
- We received donation of Tablets from "Project Pahunch" a Mumbai based youth group who came together during Covid 19 lockdown to help underprivileged students by providing gazettes for accessing online classes. We gave 6 tablets to students in 10th std. who shared the gazette with 20 students. This has helped not only the children but also the teachers and ORWs to take their classes.
- 9 students passed 10th std. board exams with good marks.




Health

This year more focus was on Health as amidst Covid 19 pandemic taking care of health was the most important concern. Community people were encouraged and advised to go to Govt. Hospital for treatment and Check-ups. They were also guided to the right place of treatment

Covid 19 Pandemic

- This year due to Covid 19 pandemic awareness sessions were taken to take precaution to
 fight against Novel Corona Virus. In all communities Asha workers informed the children and
 adults in the communities about hand wash technique and using masks. The precaution to
 be taken and what type of food needs to be consumed to improve immunity so that the
 body can fight the infectious virus'
- Fumigation was also done at Patil, Shubham, Birajdar & Hingnemala Wasti.
- Hand wash demo and awareness session was conducted on 24th April.
- A house to house survey for Covid 19 was done by Asha workers at Patil Wasti.


Awareness on Menstrual Hygeine

Nutrition:

- Due to Lockdown the daily wage earners of the community faced difficulties in arranging food. New Vision and other organisations provided dry ration and cooked food to some of the communities.
- During the lockdown for Covid 19, many families lost their job and had financial problems for which children were deprived of proper nutrition and it started affecting their physical growth and health. Looking to the nutrition need of children we started giving one snack to children between 0-6 yrs.
- As the children between 0-1 yrs cannot have the snack, the same was given to their mothers as they breast feed their children. Total 129 nutrition packs were distributed among the children from 1st to 31stOctober. Detail number is given below:



Meetings

The meetings were on child Rights issues & programs. The meeting helped to plan campaigns on right to education and make a study and survey on children's situation in pandemic and many activities are reflected in this report. The meeting included a. General body meetings b. executive body meeting on various child rights issues and program c. RCJJ for work on JJB children d. Task force meeting and raised voice on child labour issue e. DCPU and CWC members to work collaboratively on child protection system in pune. Many issues were raised and work has started with child protection unit of POCSO and VCPC formation and on other issues. f.Nirbhayasamiti of yerwada region. 6 ARC members attended this meeting g. TDH partners meeting. ARC member presented challenge of online education system in this meeting. We had shared ARC study on children situation in lockdown. (WOPPM meet – 15 July to 17 July)

Survey and advocacy on child labour (during lockdown), children protection status in lockdown and submitted to the media and government in collaboration with CACL.

On the occasion of Anti Child Labour Day a State level survey report on child labour was released in media by ARC and CACL

A study was done by ARC on good practices of NGOs who worked during pandemic on child rights and submitted the report to media

Workshops/Trainings/Webinar

Various online workshops and webinar were conducted related to child rights. Organized webinar for ARC member and the topic was How to work in community in pandemic. All ARC members attended this meeting and share their ideas and experience. It was useful for all members to understand how to work remotely in this pandemic. The training included JJ ACT., child sexual abuse, Safe and Permanent child reintegration, universalization of Education and Emerging challenges from covid 19", Child rights subjects -child labour, situation of children in lockdown, VCPC, how to handle CSA cases in lockdown situation, Bal samrakshan samiti &Right to Education

Advocacy

- Advocated with CWC 1 and CWC 2 to support young orphan children with the support of new vision.
- Advocated with labour department to plan a raid in 5 different areas where we mapped child labour and rescued 1 child labour(12 years old) who was working in a hotel.

Child Protection

- Intervened in child sexual abuse, child marriage cases and took up child right violation cases
- Filed FIR for violation of Child Right cases with the support of CWC, DCPU and our network group.

Child Participation

 Organized 1 online youth meeting in which a training for youth was on the topic of 'violence and children'

Counselling: 4 students received individual counselling. It was mostly related to their family and personal challenges and issues. And some were about career.

Life Skill Sessions: Human Library sessions were organized for the students. Each session of Human Library covered topics which reflect the reality of life and how one should deal with it.

25th Oct' 2020 - Session on Feminism -

29th Nov' 2020 – Session on Xenophobic – It is deep rooted pre historic fear and dislike of others 31st March'2021 – Session on Alopecia – a disease that has hair loss and temporary medicine is steroids. Ms Ketaki Jani, first alopecia model in India took the session.

E. COVID RELIEF PROGRAM

During Covid 19 many of the families lost their jobs due to Lockdown. The most affected were the daily wage labourers. The situation was helpless and getting one time meal was also very difficult. In this difficult time we arranged grocery kits which was distributed in the communities and construction site labour camp where we are working. Apart from that we also provided cooked food packets in our communities for some days. Also 400 cooked food packets were distributed in 3 locations for 30 days.


Challenges & Achievements:

- This year the Covid 19 pandemic was a big crisis which was itself one of the biggest challenges till now. We were unable to conduct the activities planned for this year. Online education introduced by school authorities added more difficulties as the school going children in our communities were unable to access online classes due to unavailability of android phone and access to internet. The teachers and ORW also had difficulties in reaching to the children due to lockdown.
- Due to the outbreak of Covid -19, Novel Corona Virus all over the world, our office and centres were closed from 19th March 2020.
- Many families from the communities and construction sites migrated to their native place.
- From 24th March Lock down was declared in the entire country and no one was allowed to go outside.
- Janta Curfew was amended. The community people started facing problem as their earning had stopped and they had no money to buy basic essentials like food.
- Looking at the critical scenario relief work started. In all the communities food grains were distributed to the families
- Arrangement of cooked food (one time meal) in some communities were done

Achievement:

- Developed strong rapport with the communities as we were a big support for them during the pandemic.
- The staff of New Vision worked relentlessly without any hesitation throughout the year.
- The team participation was commendable in-spite of many challenges.
- The team showed interest in learning technology and adapted the new mode of working online with same passion and efficiency
