A. OPENING EDUCATIONAL PATHWAYS FOR MIGRANT CHILDREN (OEPMC)

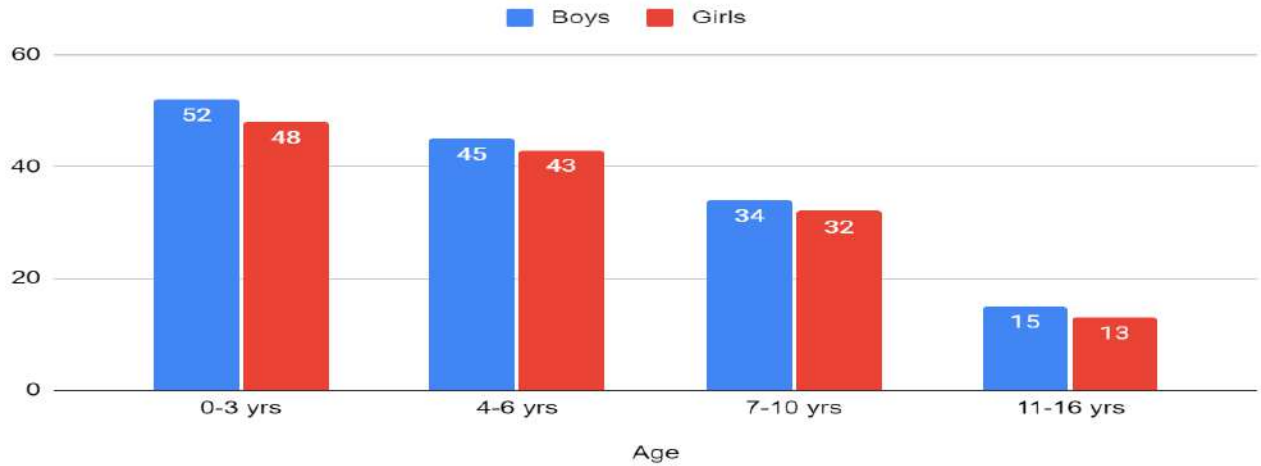
The **Opening Education Pathways for Migrant Children (OEPMC)** project, focuses on urban migrant children in the city of Pune. The project intervenes in giving children access to teaching and learning experiences. The prime areas of intervention of the OEPMC project are *Education, Health and Social Developmental*. As New Vision works with the migrant population it may not be possible to mainstream all the children into formal school; however sincere efforts are being taken to train every child at least till the time they are at the site. Some children, who are expected to remain at the site for more than 6 months, are assisted in formal school enrolment. Children of school going age are admitted in their age appropriate class room under the Right to education act (RTE). This year the pandemic affected the migrant in the first quarter of the year, later from April 2021 things started getting slowly normal. However, it's a long way to go... The economic and financial situation is most affected in the city of Pune, similar to the entire world. The poor and marginalized suffer the most and so is the case with the migrant workers from the project. Workers started returning to work and also coming back to the city from their respective home towns.

Education:

Education is the starting point of intervention of the project. Education is 'Enlightenment'. Irrespective of the condition of poverty, in India, education plays an important part in all sections of the society.

In the OEPMC projects there are totally 13 centers operational, as on March 2022. Details of Education are as follows:

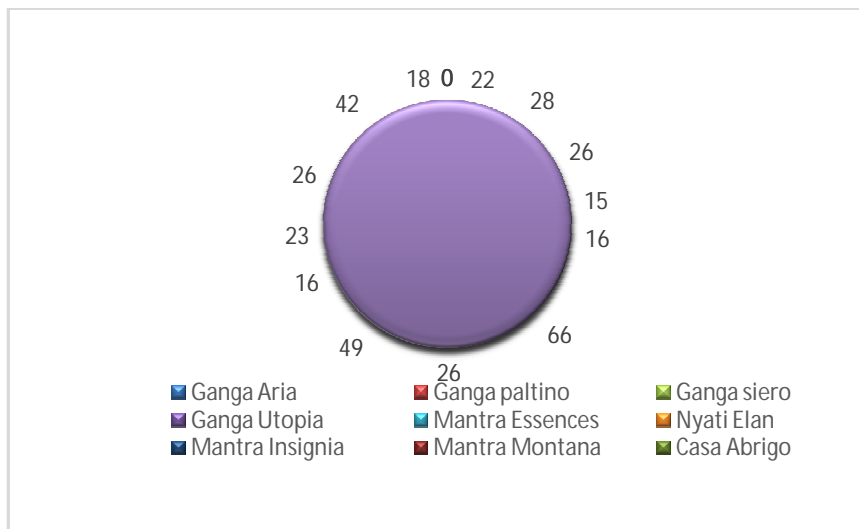
Age wise Total No of Children in 2021-22



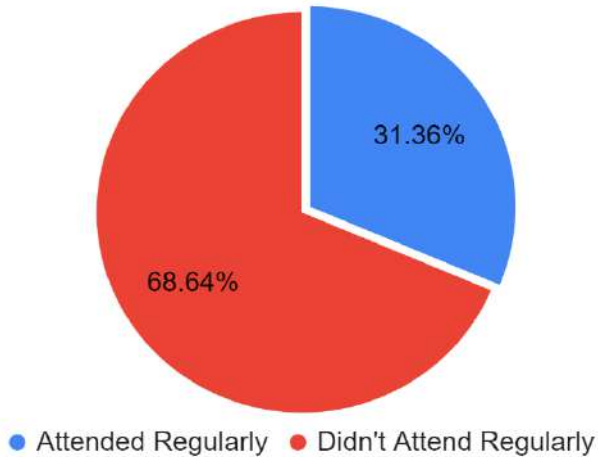

Regular age-appropriate 'Academic' activities were year along, focusing on improvement in children's education.

1: Language: local language (Marathi) recognition, through songs and pictures and conversation ,Reading, Writing, words recognition and formation , sentence formation. Reading and writing were attended to in an age appropriate manner

2: Math : Number identification, number song for recitation, shape identification, number reading and writing 1-100, tables, addition and subtraction, multiplication. are done in an age wise structure.

3: English: language recognition through songs, Alphabet recognition, alphabet formation with clay and further writing on slate and book, word and sentence formation, reading and writing, according to the age of the children are done aptly.

4: Science: recognition and names of animals and birds and plants, learning body parts, knowing and learning about environment.

5: Toddlers and Beginners : In this group, the children learn something through play way method, some creative, action songs, art work , yoga , good habit formation through schedule development,

IMPACT:

- 50% improvement in the overall academic performance of the children in the age group of 7-17 years in the academic year..
- 74.45% academic progress of 139 children between the age group of 4-6 is noted.
- This year has been a mixed on and offline academic learning year. Due to which, children's scholastic skills needed hard work, especially in the reading and writing areas. The support centres have done their best in bridging the gap and strengthen children , this year.
- Parents have cooperative and have encouraged children to learn and attend school. In a few cases, where needed, staff have managed to talk to them and ensure children go to school.



HEALTH:



Health & Weight

Once in a month height and weight of all children was taken to monitor their growth. In the age group of 0 to 6, increase in height 40.96% and weight 60.52% has improved. In the age group of 7 to 16 an increase in height 44.83% and weight 52.69% has improved.



Nutrition

Freshly cooked Mid-day meal is served to the children every day. A planned menu chart is given that covers all nutrition values including varieties of fruits & leafy vegetables. Proper care is given to the diet of children as it helps building their immunity. Twice in a month egg is served to the children. It has been observed that the children are growing properly, and their health parameters are improving and developing.

Immunization and Health Check-up camp

Regular health check-up camp was conducted at Mantra Essence, Mantra Insignia, Mantra Montana and Mantra 99 River Front and 29 Gold Coast Centre. The health check-up of **105** children and some of their Parents was done.



Sanitization:

All centres were regularly sanitized following all COVID protocols. Our centre teacher and Helper have taken the responsibility for maintaining hygiene of children by doing hand wash, maintaining social distance, wearing masks, and monitoring the temperature.



SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT :

Summer Camp :



In the month of June, an Online Summer Camp between 14th June to 21st June was organized. The volunteers arranged this Summer camp using the storytelling method. Topics such as Art and Craft, Fun with science, Fun Yoga, Drawing and Painting, signing, Best of waste, were covered. Totally **125** children attended the summer camp. Children participated with enthusiasm and enjoyed the online method.



Bal Sabha

Every month Bal Sabha (Children's Meeting) was conducted on various subjects wherein, they discuss on various topics (as follows) and share their views and experiences. Children's committee is formed. Every 3 month children in the committee are changed.

Value Education: Value education sessions were conducted every month in the year, during discussion & Interaction happened on *topics namely: Cooperation, Respect, Honesty, Punctuality, patience Reality, Mercy, The Power Of Unity, Cleanliness, Sensibility, and visionary.*

Parents Meeting: Parent's Meeting was conducted by the teacher where- in parents in smaller groups were addressed. The Meeting was interactive and parents came up with various questions and queries.

members. The training focused on the development of children between the age group of 0-6 years that included play -way method &Cognitive development activities.

Early Childhood Care Development Session:

Childhood care and Nurture is an important aspect in Child Development and Parental care. All the parents of migrant child understand very little or nothing about the same. This is due to lack of education and sometimes due to wrongcultural practices. It is very important to impart awareness and educate parents about thesame, so that the children grow well both when they are at the centers and at home.

In this year we conducted training session for parents on Early Child Care Development by external resource person. The session was

conducted in centre on Sundays as parents were available on holidays.In this meeting we informed the parents about the important factors in development of a child and what affect their development and Nutrition. The attendance and participation of men in this meeting was seen to have increased. The meeting was interactive, and parents came up with various queries and question.

139 children between 0-6 years of age are engaged in Early childhood development in the project.

B: ENHANCING CHILD RIGHTS AND BUILDING CHID CARE COMMUNITIES (ECR-BCCG)

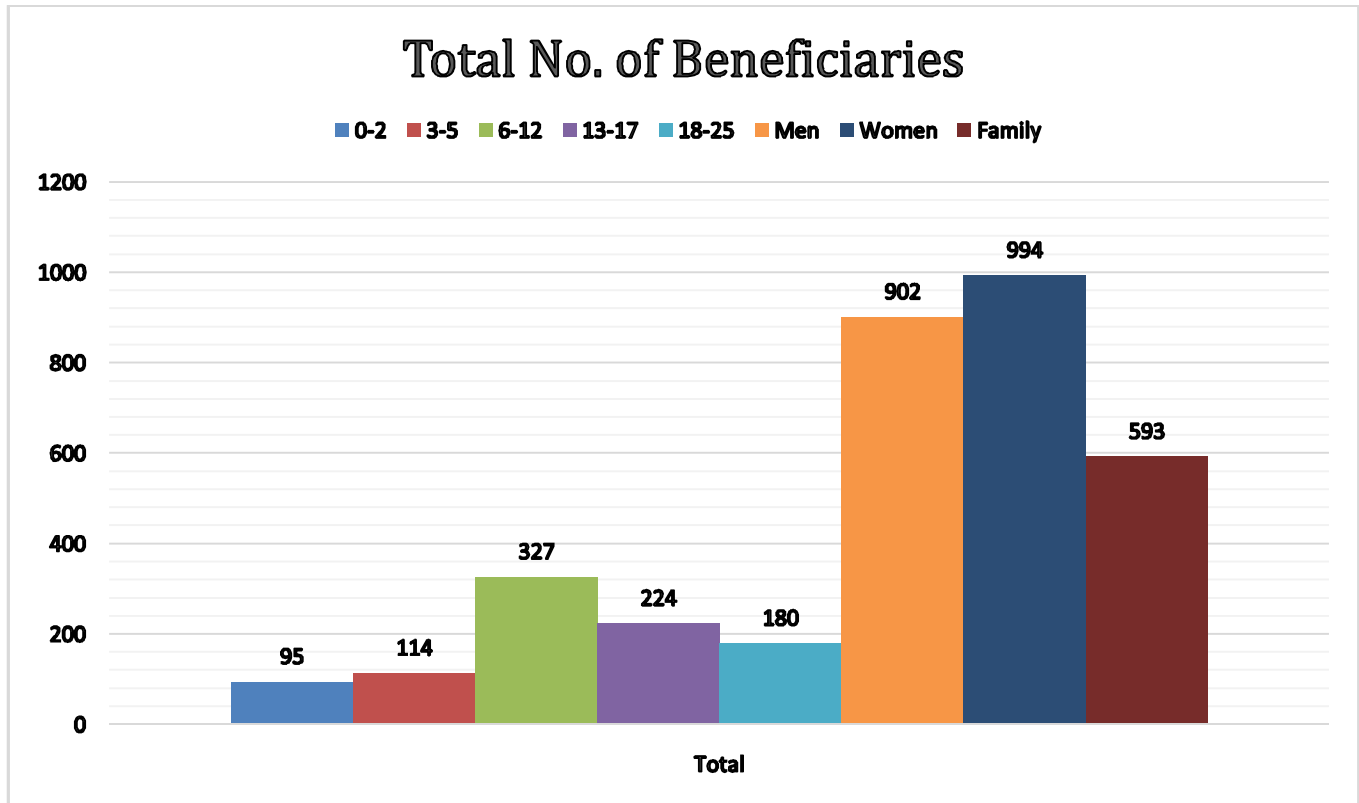
Focusing through our intervention to assist and guide the street children, helping them for an overall holistic development, project ECR-BCCG – “*Enhancing Child Rights and Building Child Care Communities* ”is implemented in 8communities in Pune. “**Children Resource Centre**” (CRC) was established in all communities which were managed by the community teacher or volunteer, Outreach

Worker and supervised by a Coordinator. Over the years various activities were conducted and planned as per the set indicators focusing on **Education, Health awareness, Reproductive health, Early Childhood Care, Empowerment, Life skill sessions, Right to play activities etc.** The CRC was also established as a Safe Space for Adolescents, Youth and women where the community people were encouraged and given a place to confidently share their issues, problems and conflicts and were further assisted in the same.

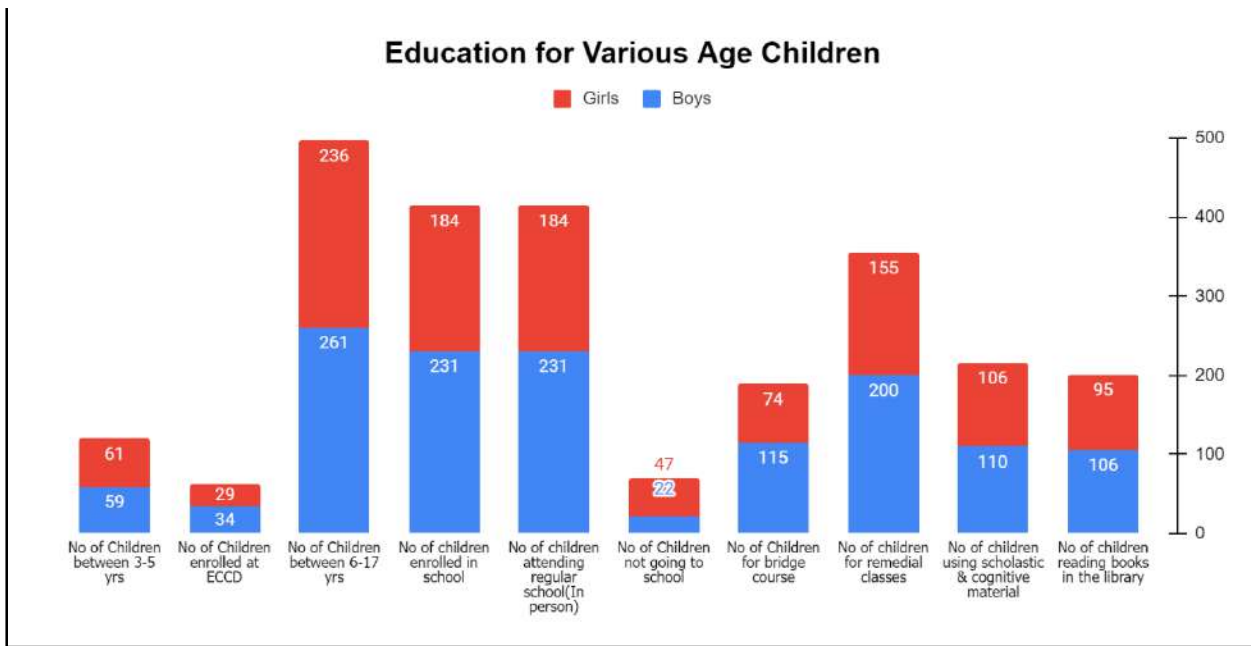

Child Resource Centre (CRC): Two new communities were identified, and child rights center was started in 2 new centers this year:

Surya Prakash Nagar community was started as a new center on June 15th 2021. This center is located in Kharadi , Pune and has a good potential to grow. The community belongs to WadariTribe . They are mostly employed in stone crushing work, and our laborious works including domestic workers. The youth and children are needy but very active and interested in developing themselves.

Subhash Nagar community which was established on an encroached illegal land of Pune Municipal Corporation where around 200 families were residing was demolished by PMC on 29th November’ 2021. The location is mainly selected to grant them legal status in the city with the promise and permission of the PCMC Commissioner. This a Fasih Paridhi community of tribes and are most needy and are daily wage laborers and domestic workers.

Summer Camp :

Online Summer Camp was organized for children from 14th to 21st June 2021. Around 166 children participated. Here are the activities conducted. All the camp was online, children thoroughly enjoyed it.

Computer Bus : In the entire year the bus was stationed in each community(excluding the ChinchwadShankar Nagar center) once in a month from morning 9.30 am to 4 pm. This service has been provided by TMCP. The facility is for children between 8 – 16 yrs. At one time the bus accommodated 9 students with a computer for every student. When a group of students were inside the bus, outside other activities were conducted for other children such as some science games, robot, remote control cars etc. This activity was both a learning and reflective one. Children enjoyed it very much and would look forward for it every week.

Covid Awareness: Awareness session on Covid 19 were taken in small groups focusing on preventive measures, treatment and vaccination. Staff facilitated the online vaccination process for many communities people in almost all the centers.

Children: D-worming camp was done in April 2021, Vitamin A, D and Iron supplements are given regularly. Iron supplements are given to both children and adults. Many children were given regular vaccination and follow up is done by Asha Worker.

Malaria Tests were done regularly in the communities

Annual Health Check: Annual Health Check-up camp was organized in all centers which was conducted by the medical team of Dr. DY Patil Hospital, Pune. The camp started from 30th August 2021 and continued till 4th September 2021 covering all the 7 communities (Excluding the Chinchwad community). In this camp, medical examination of 617 children (Between 0-18 yrs) was done.

Pregnant Women: Health camp for pregnant women is taken every month by local Arogya Kendra

- Women Health Check-up was conducted by Magarpatta Arogya Kendra team at Birajdar & Hingnemala Community. Along with medical examination urine, blood group , sugar tests were done.
- The Asha workers visit regularly to all the community. Following activities are carried out by them
 - a. Follow-ups with children, lactating mothers and pregnant women.
 - b. Hand wash session was taken by Asha workers where soaps were also distributed.
 - c. Awareness session on safe drinking water and the hygiene precautions to be taken during monsoon.
 - d. Vitamin A syrup/tablets, Iron syrup/tablets to children and women. Survey& awareness on Covid 19 Vaccination was done

Nutrition:

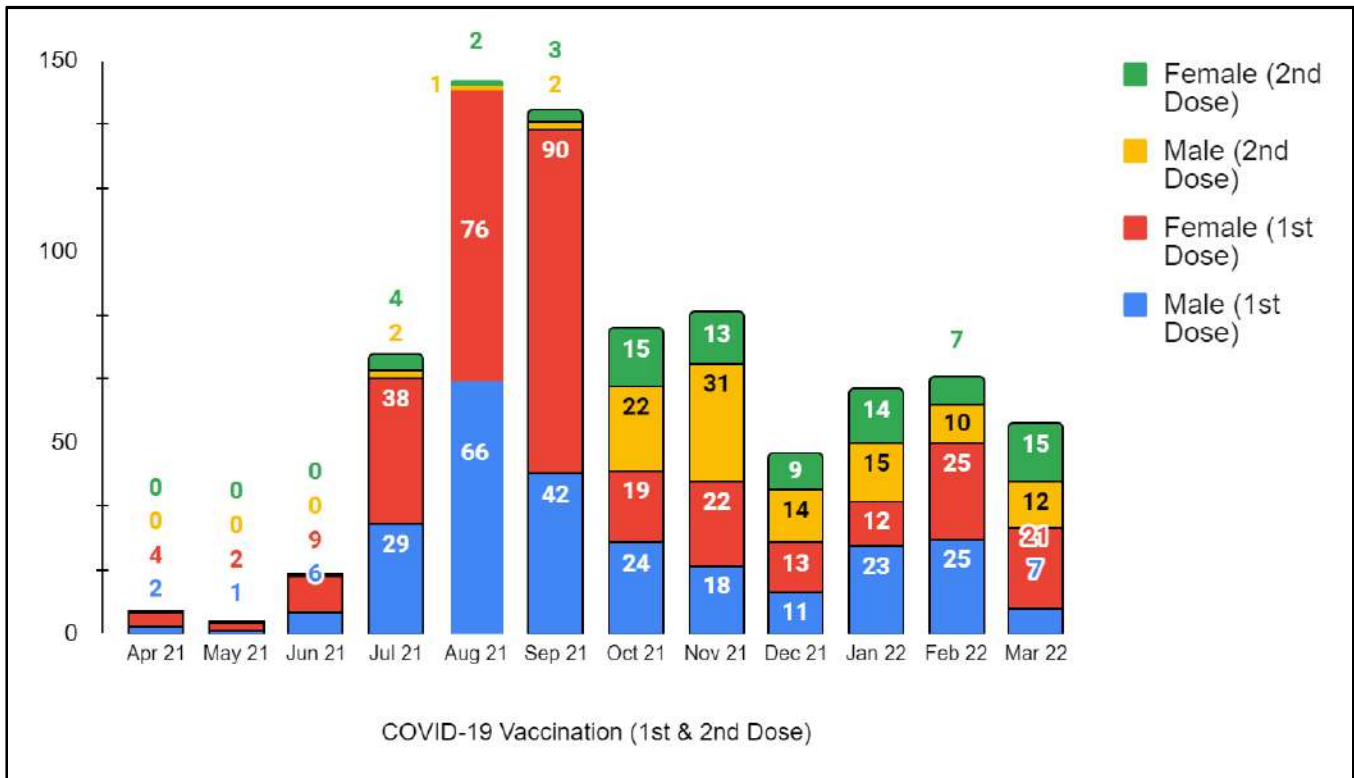
- Due to Lockdown the daily wage earners of the community faced difficulties in arranging food
- New Vision and other organisations provided dry ration and cooked food to some of the communities.
- During the lockdown for Covid 19, many families lost their job and had financial problems for which children were deprived of proper nutrition and it started affecting their physical growth and health. Looking to the nutrition need of children we started giving one snack to children between 0-6 yrs.
- As the children between 0-1 years cannot have the snack, the same was given to their mothers as they breast feed their children. Total 129 nutrition packs were distributed among the children from 1st to 31stOctober.

2 sessions on Solid waste management were held in all 7 communities in Pune. A two-hour session was taken in each community by an external resource person Mr. Vijay Pagare. The training session was taken with the help of PPTs and various activities to make the learning easier.

The following points were covered: 1. What is the source of this garbage? 2. Is it dry waste or wet waste or electronic waste (e-Waste) or sanitary waste (diaper/sanitary pad etc.) 3. Do you have dustbins at home? 4. Do you segregate the waste? 5. Are there waste pickers or PMC workers who come to collect garbage? 6. Where do they throw the garbage? 7. Who is responsible for increasing chronic spots in Communities? 8. Impact of garbage on health? 9. How can communities become garbage free? 10. Role in household composting and managing dry waste etc.

- 2: To Motivate them to develop their capacities and enable them to achieve their personal, educational and professional goals.
- 3: To facilitate a holistic approach, the project will integrate the interventions with 4 main components namely : 1: Education, 2: Healthcare, 3: Social, and 4: family development.

This year, we have the privilege to assist 'Differently able- 4 Blind' girls .Received reference from Deghi-Pune Blind school from Skill Development Centre, and contact person Mr. Mandar Shinde. Out of 4 girls 2 are partially and 2 fully visually impaired.

Counselling:

The project staff conducted counseling sessions for 7 exit students of the last year. This counselling was done to understand their future plans and goals and guide them accordingly. Also, counselling session was taken for the 4 blind girls who are newly inducted into the program.

Meeting:

The project staff conducted a meeting on the 4th July 2021 – The purpose of this meeting was to give a final visit to all the exit students to understand their future plans and also to give them an appreciation gift to encourage them for all their hard work and wishing them the best for their future endeavors.



CHALLENGES

- This year, the Covid -19 situation was much under control. All the work happened with a combination of off-line and in the field directly, although with some restrictions. Towards the end of February 2022, almost all was settled, and community outreach started with full vigour
- Children, Youths and Communities were very welcoming and glad to have in person meetings, although most of the times with some restrictions.
- Economically, people were very much unsettled and find it very difficult to re-start. Many of them lost all that they had, in small businesses and in wage earning too, due to lack of jobs and business.
- Covid -19 seem to almost have settled, this year. Soon we could witness the financial difficulties communities are facing.
- End of Pandemic has various post-effects, this year we could see them clearly. Besides finances, people are also mentally disturbed and low, they see no future. They are fearful of the same occurrence.
- It's difficult for people to decide where to restart their lives from.
- Child and youth find it difficult to focus their attention on academics. Due to online learning, the use of mobile phones has increased very highly. Maximum use of social media, tik-tok, reels etc.. has distracted children, youth, and even adults to a very large extent.
- Addiction and Abuse were also noted on the rise. This is because of frustration and anger. Jobs were lost, businesses closed, and idleness.

ACHIEVEMENTS:

- Developed stronger rapport with the communities as we were a big support for them during the pandemic.
- Digital learning has also opened up new learning arenas like Digital marketing. Especially the youths seem to benefit from this in the days to come.
- The staff of New Vision worked relentlessly without any hesitation throughout the year.
- The team participation was commendable in spite of many challenges.
- The team showed interest in learning technology and adapted the new mode of working online with the same passion and efficiency
- It was encouraging to see the staff and children getting re-connected in person for all the programs and activities in all the projects.
- Despite all odds and the pandemic crises, we are able to reach out and serve the children, youths, and communities with strength vigor and resources.
- As an organisation, we have been able to interview in facilitating school Enrollment for children, in spite of lack of some documents being migrants, thus keeping them away from child labour.
- This year, we have been able to file a complaint against ill-legal liquor shop in the community that was affecting children and the community at large.
- Organization staff have stood by the children in case of domestic abuse from parents or others and have been able to handle it adequately using legal government resources and counselling.



SUCCESS STORIES :

1: **Meet Tirumalla**, a young , beautiful and intelligent young girl, who would happily attend school regularly. Until, Covid-19 Scattered everyone , moreso the poor. Due to financial crises in th family,Tirumalla started selling vegetablesto support her parents . Child Labour in india is often justified with Poverty and has seen its worse during and after covid -19 . The need to make ends meet , is what parents and the socieity at large carelessly treat Child Labour and many of its forms. ***In no way, can this be justified.*** New Vision as an organisation, strives to relase chidren from this kind of social evil and stands fearlessly for their Rights..

On hearing about Tirumalla selling vegetables, the project staff rushed to her rescue. The centre teacher , first met with her parents. It was surprising to know that her parents were both educated. Her mother has completed her 12th grade and father has studied ITI course , but both were jobless. They come from a place called Nanded, which is located on the eastern part of the state and work as construction workers on the site located in Dhanore, Pune, where our projects work for migrant workers children.

The parents were explained that Tirumalla, is a child and cannot be engaged in this type of work, its against the law. Simultaneously, the staff visited the Construction site office and the housing societies where Tirumalla would sell the vegetables and informed the officer in charge that this is ill-legal and that child labour is serious and that action will be taken, if this does not stop. Being alerted on time, rescued Tirumalla from child labour .

From then onwards Tirumalla, attended the school and the center regularly, she is focussed and wants to study well. Her parents too are cooperative. She has two younger brothers who study in 3rd and 9th grade respectively.

Very recently *Tirumalla, scored 66% in her 10th boards. And now she dreams of becoming a nurse...* Her parents too support her and always heed to the staffs and teachers' wise counsel. The entire family is in good contact with the project staff particularly, with the teacher.

Timely action and the compassion to do so fearlessly yield positive results and change the lives of the children, who are most vulnerable, helpless and so exploited, many a time due to circumstance and poverty.

2: Basic needs of life are unmet in city slums and the poor keep striving to attain them and often go on living without having them. The reason being, they are often neglected, and they do not know how to exercise their rights as individuals and citizens of the country. But, once they learn to do so, they become strong and bring about a **CHANGE**. Children and Youths can become **AGENTS of CHANGE**, if guided and strengthened rightly. Here is a story of our recently started communities, where we commenced our work from June 2021, it's called Suryaprakashnagar, located in Kharadi, Pune

While doing a grocery distribution drive in this community we met many youths and started interacting with them, trying to understand them and their problems. In our regular conversations with the youth, they led the Covid-19 donation drive, conducted by the organization. Gradually relationship with the youth strengthened with our project trainer, Outreach worker along with the center teacher. On 9th July 2021, the staff had a session with the children and youths discussing about their problems. The most important and necessary problem they were facing was scarcity of 'WATER'.

The children and youths informed us that they get water only for 10 minutes in the morning at 6 am. The children and community people fetch water from far off. Also, if they go to the nearby neighborhood to fetch water, they are humiliated and restricted. They visited the corporator many times, but in vain. When they shared this experience with our project staff, they advised and helped the youth to write an application stating their issue related to water. They took signatures of the community people who have water problem and went to corporator along with the project center teacher and outreach worker. The corporator at first was quite surprised, but was cooperative. He immediately sent a water tanker to the community and has promised to get the water pipeline repaired in 8 days.

The Government and its governance will need to oblige if we use the government machinery and the legal system in a united and powerful way to present our issues and attain solution. It is although sad that, the basic need of water needs so much strive....



3: Yavatmal is a district located in the region of Vidarbha, in the east-central part of Maharashtra state in India. A very dry agriculture belt, that always causes serval thousand farmers to commit suicide due to outstanding debts and their inability to pay them off. Chanchal Pawar is a beautiful girl who hails from a village called 'Paras Wai', which is about 38 kilometers from Yavatmal city. It's a small village comprising nearly 200 households, all of them engaged in farming. Chanchal's parents are farmers. They work on their own small farm. Since the land is very dry and other than the monsoons farming does not yield any returns, her father works as a worker in a company located in Yevatmal city. He hardly earns enough to meet the family's needs.



Chanchal has 2 sisters, one of them is married and stays in the nearby village and the other one is working as a 'computer operator in a company in Pune city. She has 1 brother who is doing his bachelor's in science in her hometown and helps the family financially, by doing tailoring work.

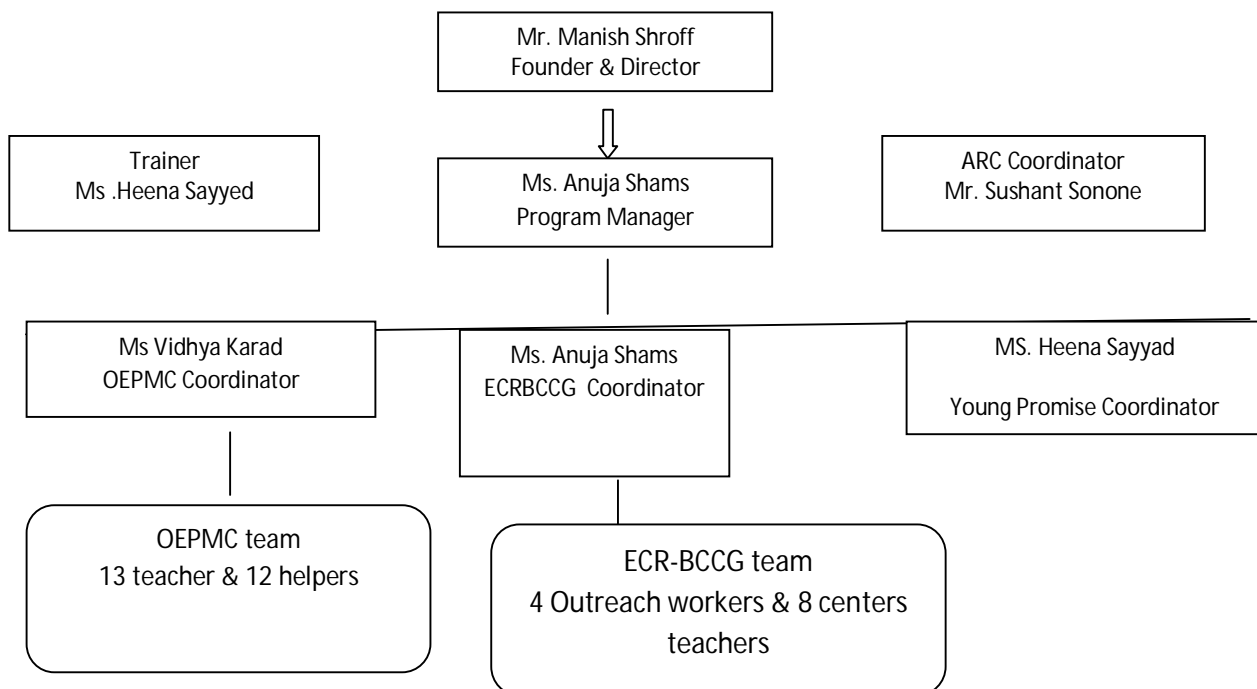
With much financial stress and limitation, poverty is not a choice for many in India. Despite all the odds, especially despite her condition of being 'BLIND' Chanchal has always been blessed with opportunities, although she is the only Blind child in the family. She is pursuing her bachelor's in arts (BA) in Pune city and simultaneously doing her

certificate course in “Naturopathy”. She has successfully completed her 3 months course and has another 9 months to go. After which, she should be able to fetch herself a good job as a “Therapist”. She likes the course and finds it interesting. *‘I will be self-reliant with the skills I learn in the course’ says Chanchal.* ‘But I will not stop here. I am also preparing for competitive exams. If I can clear these government competitive exams, I can get a good government job in any government setting with a good salary and benefits. Since I am blind there are government quotas for people like me’, further adds Chanchal.

Motivated, encouraged, and willing to go a mile or more extra to achieve greater heights is Chanchal’s story. With examples as such, it leaves no room for you and me to be encouraged, no matter what!
